

A table, full of candy, smiling faces, and great information, was set up in front of Miller Hall with the purpose of informing undergraduate students about the program here at JMU. VASP FALL CONFERENCE

ASIST Training

During the summer semester, the current second year graduate students attended a two day training titled Applied Suicide Intervention Skills Training (ASIST). This workshop was facilitated by Jane Wiggins and Debbie Kats. Over the course of the two days students learned suicide first-aid to help a person at risk stay safe and seek further help as needed. The presenters used roleplay and group simulation's while teaching students how to use a suicide intervention model. Students were taught how to identify people with thoughts of suicide, how to find a shared understanding of reasons in identifying people with thoughts and helping to develop a Safeplan based upon a review of risk.

INTER-PROFESSIONAL EDUCATION SEMINAR

On October 29th the Inter-professional Education Seminar was held to train nursing, occupational therapy, school counseling, school psychology, special education, speech language pathology and school social work professionals on how the can come together in a school setting to help children, families and communities. The first half of the workshop we learned about all the different disciplines and were able to ask each other questions about each discipline. The second half of the workshop we were split into groups and read over a case study to determine how we would all help this child and what part we would each play in all of it. The groups were challenged to problem solve as a group and come up with a solution together rather than each discipline problem solving by themselves.



REVIVE Training

Students attended a training in October with presenters Larry Friedman and Erin Bodkin, where they learned how to recognize and respond to an opioid overdose emergency using Naloxone. Our students were also given time to discuss with those in other professions how this training could be used in their chosen field.
