Curriculum Highlights

THREE CONCENTRATIONS

- The Human Resource Management (HRM) concentration is designed to help students broaden and deepen their understanding of the acquisition, development, management and retention of human capital in organizations.
- The Innovation and Entrepreneurship (ENT) concentration is designed to provide students with an introduction to the role of innovation in business development. It provides a solid foundation in the principal elements of entrepreneurship and small business management and the opportunity to gain hands-on experience working with a team to create a new business venture.
- The Management Consulting (MC) concentration is designed to develop and enhance students' critical thinking, problem solving and decision-making skills. In this track students engage in research and analysis to build a strong foundation for learning and implementing the business analysis and consulting process.

COB ACCEPTANCE

After completing the lower-level B.B.A Core Courses and earning at least a 2.7 average GPA in those courses (excluding calculus and managerial accounting) students may apply for formal acceptance into the College of Business and become eligible for upper-level courses.
