Frequently Asked Questions

What do I get?

Degree: Master of the Arts in Teaching (MAT)
Virginia Teaching License: Kindergarten-12th grade Special Education, Accessing the General Education Curriculum

Who is eligible to apply?

Anyone who already holds a bachelor's degree or anticipates receiving his or her degree within the year and is interested in a career as a special educator is eligible.

When does it start and how long does it take?

The program begins in the summer. Full-time students can complete the program in three semesters and two summers. Part-time students are subject to varying timelines.

What kind of practical experience will I receive?

Each semester teacher candidates participate in area schools to complete course requirements. Prior to student teaching, students also have a formal field experience when they take EXED 610. Permission is required for candidates who work as paraprofessionals and would like to use their work placement to meet practicum requirements. Students who work are encouraged to seek employment that enriches their teacher education studies.

When are the classes and can I work and take classes at the same time?

Classes in this program, except summer classes and practicum, are held late afternoon and evening to allow candidates to work as graduate assistants, substitute teachers, or paraprofessionals. The final fall semester includes two 8 week full day student teaching internships. In order to get the most out of the whole graduate school experience,

part time work is appropriate except during student teaching when students are expected to be FULLY available to the demands of that experience. Good financial planning will enable students to take full advantage of the opportunities within the program and the university.

How many students are in the program?

Each summer approximately 5-12 candidates enter the program. If you are a full-time student, you can expect to have the same group of classmates for many of your classes if they are full time students as well. Some courses are open to students in other programs and, consequently, may be larger.

Who are these students?

Because this program is designed for candidates who already hold a bachelor's degree, the range of students' backgrounds is diverse. Bachelor's degrees include business, education, foreign language, the arts, social sciences, sciences, technological careers, and the like. Some students enter the program directly from having received their undergraduate degrees, but many students return for their Master's degrees years after having received their bachelors.

Can I student teach outside the area as opposed to near Harrisonburg?

At this time student teaching placements are limited to school districts in and around James Madison University.

Can I afford it?

Careful planning will help you come prepared to get the most of this experience. A loan can help you achieve your goal sooner. For some, working and saving for another year may allow you to fully engage in classes without worrying about finances. The financial aid office is available to assist you. In addition to graduate tuition (see specifics on JMU web site), there are textbooks, miscellaneous fees, and various tests required by the State of Virginia (see details under the "tests and fees" section).

Departmental and College-wide scholarship applications are usually available during the January/February time frame for currently enrolled students and students who have accepted admission into the graduate program. Applying - 3 Steps

Step 1: Transcript Review and Interview

Schedule a meeting with Dr. Allison Kretlow (program coordinator). You will need to bring a copy of your undergraduate transcript(s), unofficial is sufficient to determine eligibility and any prerequisite courses that may be needed. *

Step 2: Applying to Graduate School

Complete the on-line graduate school application, applying to the Special Education post-baccalaureate M.A.T. (NOT the 5th year format) <http://www.jmu.edu/grad/>

The order of applying and taking tests for applying to the graduate school is not important. Applications will be reviewed after all items have been received.

Required for application:

- 1) Official transcripts from all colleges or universities attended.
- 2) Satisfactory test scores on the Praxis I
- 3) Two letters of recommendation, one from someone who can speak of your ability as a student and another who can speak of your professional dispositions
- 4) Professional resume
- 5) 2-3 page written statement describing your professional background, the educational issues or topics that you would like to address during your master's program and your long-term professional goals

NOTE Your application to the **Graduate School**, if accepted, will likely be “conditionally” accepted. After all the conditions have been met, including being fully accepted into **Teacher Education, Step 3**, your status can be upgraded to “unconditional”. It is your responsibility to let your advisor know when all conditions have been met. These conditions (receipt of satisfactory Praxis I & II scores, etc.) must be met before registering for the 2nd semester of classes.

Step 3: Applying to Teacher Education via TK20

After you have been admitted to the Graduate School and have received your student ID, you may apply for admission to Teacher Education. Your application to Teacher Education is the first step in the process toward obtaining your Virginia State License to teach.

PRAXIS I MAY BE TAKEN PRIOR TO submitting your application to Teacher Education

- 1) **Complete the application** to teacher education USING TK20*
- 2) **Take the Praxis I** –Math, Reading Comprehension and Writing **NOTE** Praxis I is waived for candidates with SAT scores of 1100 or higher, the minimum scores for each section is 530 Math and 530 Verbal.
- 3) To be fully accepted into the Early Childhood Education Teaching Licensure program, candidates must have a **minimum undergraduate GPA of 2.75** or must establish a JMU GPA of 2.75 or better by taking 9 or more credit hours. These may include GPSY 160 and EDUC 360, content prerequisites or courses within the program.

* To access TK20 services:

Complete an online, intent to enroll form <http://coe.jmu.edu/esc/Admissions.shtml>

- (1) Print off and take/send to your advisor for signature
- (2) Take the signed form to the Education Support Center – Mem Hall Rm 7230.
- (3) After you have submitted your intent to enroll form, you will receive an E-mail directing you to access the TK20 website (within 2-3 days of submitting form)

Next complete the Teacher Education Application form found in TK20. You will be directed to find the application artifact, complete it and save it in TK 20. The application will include:

- 200 word response in a text box to “Why I want to become a teacher?”
- Self rating on professional dispositions
- Welcome Letter
- List of Admission requirements- with a reminder about Child Abuse Prevention and Universal Precautions trainings
- FAQ sheet for TK 20
- Reference Forms

Within 24 hours after subscribing, you will receive an email from TK 20 saying that you can now access your account.

APPLICATION to TK 20 WILL BE AVAILABLE ONE MONTH PRIOR TO THE START OF THE SEMESTER UNTIL 1 WEEK BEFORE REGISTRATION BEGINS FOR THE NEXT SEMESTER.

By having access to the Tk20 system, you will be able to:

1. Complete your teacher education application forms online. This includes applications for admission to the program and for student teaching.
2. Build your artifacts (products) electronically, online use by you for years, even after graduation.
3. Create electronic portfolios for documenting your work for presentation to the faculty and prospective employers.
4. Have a fully documented record of your field experience work and your experience with student teaching/clinical practice.
5. Access to performance evaluation and feedback.
6. Receive news and updates on College of Ed services, programs, and events.
7. Access up to date information on employment opportunities.

Registering for Classes

Students who are not yet accepted, but who wish to register for a class may do so with permission of the program coordinator and course instructor and by registering as a “Special Student.” See the Graduate School for details. To register as a degree seeking student **you must have** a student identification number (E-ID) obtainable after you have been accepted into the graduate program.

Beyond the first semester or 12 credit hours, students must have met all of the requirements for “unconditional acceptance” before being able to register for additional classes.

Additional courses may be required for licensure, are determined by the individual needs of the candidate, and are approved by the advisor.

The course sequence can be adjusted for part-time students.

Graduate Assistantships

Assistantships provide an opportunity to work alongside professors in a professional setting. Most employers prefer students who are available for at least a year. However, some positions may be available only for spring or fall semester.

Graduate assistantships in the department (20 hours/wk) offer a tuition waiver equivalent to three classes per semester and a living stipend that is paid on a bi-weekly basis. Contract dates vary by department and details (stipends, tuition waivers, time requirements, etc.) will be discussed when an offer has been extended.

- To be eligible students must be unconditionally **or** conditionally accepted into a graduate program.

- Positions are limited so early application is encouraged – (Jan-Feb. for following Fall)
- Positions may be offered as soon as a student has been accepted to graduate school, Positions remain open until filled.

To apply for a Graduate Assistantship within the department:

Applications are available in the Department of Exceptional Education Office, Memorial Hall 3126. Complete the application form and return it with a resume attached to the Department of Exceptional Education Office where you picked up the form. Assistantships are not available during student teaching.

Praxis II: VA does not require a Praxis II for SPED. Students are encouraged to consider taking a praxis II test in a content area if they think they can pass (e.g. Elementary content

or middle school science) to earn “highly qualified” status in VA. If you want to teach outside of VA, check the ETS website for testing requirements of that state.
