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Bios

Gabriel Dobner has played for such notable singers as Kevin McMillan, Gerhard Siegel, Rod Gilfry, Cornelia Kallisch and René Kollo. He has recorded for Haenssler Classic and MDG in Germany, and Ottavo in Holland. Following his first CD recording with mezzo-soprano Cornelia Kallisch for MDG, Mr. Dobner was referred to as a "master among Lieder pianists" in a BBC Music Magazine review. Performances recorded for radio broadcast include those for the Bavarian State Radio, West German Radio, North German Radio, Budapest Radio in Hungary, Nippon Broadcasting Corporation in Japan, and Saint Paul Sunday in the U.S. He has performed in many of the world's leading venues including those in Vienna, Dresden, Hamburg, Munich, Frankfurt, Cologne, Zürich, Budapest, Barcelona, Tokyo, Nagoya and Seoul. Mr. Dobner joined the piano faculty at JMU in 2001 and has also been on the faculty of AIMS (American Institute of Musical Studies) in Graz, Austria, since 2017.

Steinway Artist Eric Ruple is on the piano faculty at JMU. He enjoys an active career as a solo and chamber musician, which includes performances at the Kennedy Center in D.C. and Steinway Hall in New York. Dr. Ruple is a pianist for the Virginia Symphony Orchestra, which includes the principal keyboard role in the Harry PotterTM Film Concert Series. He was featured in Bernstein's Prelude, Fugue and Riffs with the VSO Jazz Ensemble. His recording Musica Incognito with hornist Ian Zook has earned unanimous positive reviews from several national and international publications; he is currently working on another recording project with violinist Maureen Yuen. Dr. Ruple is president of the Shenandoah Valley/JMU Chapter of the American Liszt Society and has been a regular adjudicator in Hong Kong. In 2019–2020, he served as interim director for the JMU School of Music. He received his doctoral degree from the University of Michigan.

Paulo Steinberg has performed as a soloist and collaborative pianist across the U.S., Canada, South America and Europe. During his sabbatical leave in 2017, he undertook a European recital tour stretching from the U.K. to Latvia that included Ireland, Scotland, Luxembourg, Austria, Germany and Sweden. He holds piano performance degrees from Conservatório Carlos Gomes, Universidade de São Paulo, Arizona State University (M.M) and Indiana University (D.M.). Dr. Steinberg often serves as an adjudicator in competitions, and offers master classes, lectures, workshops and performances in the U.S. and abroad. His summers regularly include teaching at the Saarburg Chamber Music Festival in Germany and traveling around Europe, Brazil and Canada. His research interests focus on piano technique and Brazilian music. Four CD albums have been released recently: The Recital Clarinetist in collaboration with clarinetist Dr. Janice Minor: Duos in collaboration with clarinetist Dr. Sarunas Jankauskas; Time, Place, Spirit in collaboration with flutist Dr. Beth Chandler; and his solo CD album Alma Brasileira. paulosteinberg.com Instagram: @paulosteinberg

Lori Piitz enjoys an exciting musical life that includes such diverse opportunities as a solo recital at Steinway Hall in New York City, a four-hand recital at the Kennedy Center, and performing in a German opera house dressed as a baby chick! She has performed at music festivals in the U.S and abroad, including festivals of the American Liszt Society, the Schleswig-Holstein Festival in Germany, and the Music & Beyond Festival and Festival of the Sound in Canada. Ms. Piitz was recently the piano soloist in Gershwin's Variations on "I Got Rhythm" for piano and orchestra at the Staunton Music Festival. Her interest in pianist health led to membership in PAMA (Performing Arts Medicine Association) and studies in injury-preventive piano technique with Dr. Barbara Lister-Sink. In 2002, Ms. Piitz joined the piano faculty at JMU where she works with talented piano students and teaches graduate courses in pedagogy, piano literature and "Preparing for the Job Market."
