

Things Students Should Do Before Meeting With Their Advisor

- ✓ Contact your advisor in the way he/she prefers (e.g. e-mail, cell phone, office hours) to set up an appt. Be sure to schedule enough time.
- ✓ Read about your major requirements in the catalog.
- ✓ Bring everything to your meeting that might be useful: GenEd Checklist, updated AP scores, catalog, etc.
- ✓ Think about any special needs or plans that will affect academic progress and choices and share them with your advisor.
- ✓ Understand that you are responsible for making your own academic choices and the associated consequences, good or bad.

SCHEDULE CHANGES

Few schedule changes are permitted after your Summer Springboard appointment and prior to August 27th. In the following cases **ONLY**, please call or e-mail **your** advisor or the Career and Academic Planning office for assistance. Please allow two weeks for changes to be made to your schedule:

- Change of major
- AP/IB or Dual Enrollment Credit
- Acceptance into ROTC
- Four or more classes on same day
- Back-to-back classes on opposite ends of campus

- Serves as your main resource while teaching you to be independent

Freshman Registration Policies, Definitions, and Dates



INTRODUCTION

Registering for classes for the first time is an exciting and challenging experience. James Madison University strives to assist you in this endeavor by allowing you to select preferences in General Education for which you may be pre-registered prior to your arrival on campus. Not all freshmen will receive all of their first preferences as course availability, placement scores, and choice of major affect this process. Beyond pre-registration, your summer springboard experience will conclude the class scheduling process and you will leave campus with a full course load.

REGISTRATION DATES

June 7-11 & 14-18

Pre-registration of freshmen will be completed by university staff based upon preferences, placement scores, and major

June 21, 22, 24, 25, 28, 29

Orientation/Freshman Registration

July 1, 2, 7, 8, 9, 12, 13, 14

Orientation/Freshman Registration

July 15, 16

Course registration will be completed by university staff for students unable to attend Summer Springboard

July 26 – September 7

Freshmen may swap course sections, but not classes (see definitions)

August 26

Freshmen meet with their advisors

August 27

Course adjustment for freshmen in Hillside Computer Lab

August 27 – September 7

Course adjustment for freshmen may be performed with advisor signature

August 30

First Day of Classes

Attendance is mandatory and students may be administratively dropped from classes due to non-attendance

DEFINITIONS

“e-campus” – e-campus is a tool that you will use to register for classes and review your transcript. Tutorials can be found at the following address: <http://isapps.jmu.edu/ecampus/>

“advisor hold” – This “hold” indicates that all first-year freshmen are unable to add/drop courses without advisor signature. This hold will be removed prior to registration for Spring 2011.

“course swap” – During open enrollment freshmen are permitted to swap sections of the same course (i.e. MATH 205 section 0003 for MATH 205 section 0011). Switching from GART 200 to GMUS 206 is not switching sections within the same course and is not permitted.
