Providing this opportunity for collaboration and co-authorship is so important for our graduate students.
- The <u>Undergraduate Primary Care and Rural Education (UPCARE</u>) Project Team, which consists of nursing professors <u>Erika Metzler Sawin</u> (Project Director), <u>Deborah Elkins</u>, <u>Melody Eaton</u>, <u>Christina Lam</u>, <u>Jamie Robinson</u> and <u>Tina Switzer</u>, recently completed a five-year, \$2.7 million Health Resources and Services

Administration (HRSA)-funded project. The UPCARE Team led a collaborative, academic-practice partnership between the Valley Health system and JMU Counseling and Psychological Services. Focusing on mental health, substance-use disorders, population health, and chronic disease prevention and management in rural primary care settings in Page County, the project affected health access and quality communitywide. The team and undergraduate UPCARE student scholars have disseminated their work internationally, nationally and throughout Virginia through 15 presentations, five webinars and 11 publications.

 JMU Libraries Humanities Librarian <u>Brian Flota</u> and Head of Special Collections <u>Kate Morris</u> will soon publish their co-edited essay collection <u>Comic Books</u>, <u>Special Collections</u>, and the Academic Library with ACRL Publications. The edition highlights best practices for building a diverse institutional comic collection and how to effectively incorporate the collection into research and instruction.
