I appreciate your continued, active involvement in the life of the university and Harrisonburg communities. That sense of dynamism is also at work in the examples of faculty and staff success I have to share with you today.

- Department of Communication Sciences and Disorders Director of Clinical Education <u>Michelle Dawson</u> earned Specialist Board Certification in the area of Swallowing and Swallowing Disorders from the <u>American Board of Swallowing</u> <u>and Swallowing Disorders</u> in September. This credential requires years of advanced clinical, educational, and administrative experience beyond initial certification. Candidates are also expected to demonstrate research and mentorship excellence in their field.
- Adriana Banu, Professor of Physics and Scientific Coordinator for the Madison Accelerator Laboratory, was recently awarded a \$436,952 NSF Major Research Instrumentation (MRI) - Track 2 grant for her project Development of a Next Generation Fast Neutron Detector. Track 2 MRI proposals are collaborative research proposals, and this is the first Track 2 MRI grant proposal submitted by JMU. Her work will contribute to the construction of a \$3.7 million research instrument to be used to study neutron-rich atomic nuclei at and beyond the limit of stability at FRIB, one of the world's leading facilities for rare isotope beams.
- Joy Myers, Director of the <u>Grow Your Own Campus Teaching Fellows</u> program, and program assistant director <u>Katie Shifflett</u> recently <u>co-presented with</u> <u>community college colleagues</u> at the Virginia Association of Colleges and Teacher Educators (VACTE) fall conference hosted at the University of Richmond. The meeting's theme was "The Value and Impact of Teacher Education Programs, Structures and Pedagogies," making Myers and Shifflett's presentation, "The Role of Collaboration and an Effective Grow Your Own Teacher Education Program" an ideal fit.
