- Co-authored by <u>Nicole Wilson</u>, Associate Professor of Instructional Design, Learning Innovations and Design; <u>Elaine Kaye</u>, Assistant Professor of Instructional Design, Learning Innovations and Design; and <u>Liz Chenevey</u>, Associate Professor and Health and Behavioral Studies Librarian, <u>Opening Up: A Fellowship for Open</u> <u>Pedagogy</u> was a key text in the formal instructional component of the recent Open Pedagogy Fellowship at JMU. A faculty participant stated the course "has been the best designed and executed course I have ever taken... these faculty members have made an enormous contribution to the Open Pedagogy movement with this book, which is also a gift to educators (and their students), because it is openly licensed and available to others to use for free."
- Pianist <u>Anna Showalter</u>, Doctor of Musical Arts candidate, recently presented "Listen to the Birds," the final solo recital of their program. The concert included compositions based on transcriptions of birdsong, as well as compositions that interacted with recordings of several bird species. This project builds on ongoing collaborative work between Showalter and Assistant Professor of Biology <u>Dana</u> <u>Moseley</u>. The JMU community previously learned about sound ecology from this duo during their multimodal <u>Litten Lecture</u> in February. Anna is from the studios of music professors <u>Lori Piitz</u> and <u>Gabriel Dobner</u>.
- Students in the Integrated Science and Technology (ISAT) program have launched a new venture, the ISAT Podcast. The show's inaugural episode, featuring guests Associate Professor Emily York and Assistant Professor Raafat Zaini, explores their experiences as faculty members and researchers. It also provides audience members who may not be JMU or program insiders with ISAT background information. The music you hear throughout the episode is provided by Professor and Program Director Chris Bachmann – what a delightful addition!
- Congratulations to Vice Provost for Research, Economic Development and

Innovation <u>Anthony Tongen</u> on his appointment to the <u>Commonwealth Cyber</u> <u>Initiative's Technical Advisory Board</u> and election to the Association of Public & Land-Grant Universities <u>Council on Research Leadership</u>.
