

## **Study Abroad Programs**

Students are encouraged to participate in study abroad programs to Africa, the Caribbean, and other relevant areas. In addition to the AAAD program's long-running Ghana Summer Program and East Africa Field School, Uganda: Biological and Human Dimensions of Wildlife Conservation, and South Africa: Exploration of Culture and Identity, there are numerous eligible study abroad programs listed on the AAAD website. Students who want to earn credit hours through an accredited program are encouraged to do so with prior approval of the AAAD program coordinator(s).

#### **AAAD Internships**

Students are also encouraged to seek out opportunities to apply their knowledge in professional and community-based settings. The AAAD internship coordinator regularly offers students opportunities to earn academic credit by working as AAAD Minor or Media Interns, Research Assistants, or by working for relevant community- or campus-based projects and organizations.

### **AAAD Conference**

Every February, the AAAD program hosts scholars from across the world and from across the disciplines in the humanities, social sciences, STEM, the arts, and business, as well as artists, activists, and independent scholars at its Annual African, African American, and Diaspora Studies Interdisciplinary Conference. The conference is a charged space for cross- and inter-disciplinary research exchange, debates, and networking. The AAAD minor fosters global and cultural awareness by promoting an understanding of the people, identities, and institutions of Africa and the African Diaspora.

The program takes an interdisciplinary approach to understand Africa and the African Diaspora in a global context, enhanced by program requirements drawn from several departments.

In these courses, students examine and engage with key disciplines, concepts, methods, and topics in Africana studies.

Students must successfully complete 19 credit hours within the course requirements, but no more than 9 hours can be from a single discipline.
