
Today I wanted to begin by sharing with you a few exceptional examples of your colleagues work this past week:

When teaching about music education in China to her students, **Dr. Lisa Maynard** invited **Professor Liz Lee** from South Central University for Nationalities, China to her on-line classroom. Not only did her students learn from an expert first-hand, but it helped to re-establish JMU's relationship with this Chinese university.





Dr. Paulo Steinberg invited his former piano professor from Indiana University, internationally acclaimed pianist **Evelyne Brancart** to visit his piano studio class through Zoom. Ms. Brancart answered questions regarding her career as a pianist, chamber musician, and educator. It was a special way to wrap up the academic year and to connect students who stayed in town with those who are back home as far away as South Korea.



Assistant Professor Ben Lambert adjusted the final project for his Shakespeare acting class (THEA 453). The newly adjusted final project, and the culmination of his students' semester work, is the creation of 10-minute cuts of one Shakespeare play, solo performed, and shot/edited/scored into 10-minute movies. Every movie will be streamed back-to-back as a Facebook event with a live discussion board for conversation and comments amongst audience members.

I know as we plan for the summer and fall that this creative and collaborative approach to our classes will continue to provide an exceptional education for our students. This isn't to brush aside some of the real issues experienced by our students, faculty and staff this semester. I want to hear those stories, as does senior leadership.
