[2022-2023 Award Year Deadline Dates for Reports and Other Records Associated with the Free Application for Federal Student Aid \(FAFSA\), the Federal Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grant Program \(FSEOG\) Program, the Federal Work-Study \(FWS\) Program, the Federal Pell Grant \(Pell Grant\) Program, the William D. Ford Federal Direct Loan \(Direct Loan\) Program, the Teacher Education Assistance for College and Higher Education \(TEACH\) Grant Program, and the Iraq and Afghanistan Service Grant Program, 87 Federal Register 33135, June 1, 2022](#)

NOTICE: The Secretary announces deadline dates for the receipt of documents and other information from applicants and institutions participating in certain Federal student aid programs authorized under title IV of the Higher Education Act of 1965, as amended (HEA), for the 2022-2023 award year. These programs, administered by the Department of Education (Department), provide financial assistance to students attending eligible postsecondary educational institutions to help them pay their educational costs.

DEADLINE FOR INSTITUTIONS: 60 days following the institution's first request to the student to submit the required V4 or V5 identity and high school completion documentation. Note: changes to previously submitted Identity Verification Results must be updated within 30 days of the institution becoming aware that a change has occurred.

[Submission to the Office of Management and Budget for Review and Approval; Comment Request; Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System \(IPEDS\) 2022-23 Through 2024-25, 87 Federal Register 33140, June 1, 2022](#)

NOTICE: Current authorization expires August 31, 2022 (OMB# 1850-0582 v.24-29). NCES is requesting a new clearance for the 2022-23, 2023-24, and 2024-25 data collections to enable us to make changes to the IPEDS data collection components, clarify definitions and instructions throughout the components, and to continue the IPEDS collection of postsecondary data over the next three years. This clearance package includes a number of proposed changes to the data collection. As part of the public comment period review, NCES requests that IPEDS data submitters and other stakeholders respond to the directed questions found in Appendix D of this submission.

[60-Day Notice of Proposed Information Collection: Nonimmigrant Visa Application, 87 Federal Register 33571, June 2, 2022](#)

NOTICE: The DS-160 and DS-156 collect biographical and other information from individuals seeking a nonimmigrant visa or individuals seeking a boarding foil for purposes of traveling to the United States to seek parole from the Department of Homeland Security. The consular officer uses the information collected to elicit information necessary to determine an applicant's eligibility for a nonimmigrant visa. The consular officer uses the information collected on the form to screen individuals seeking a boarding foil for purposes of obtaining parole pursuant to an agreement between the Department of State and the Department of Homeland Security. Most respondents use the DS-160; however, posts may authorize an individual to use the paper-based DS-156 in limited circumstances outlined in the notice.

Requirement That Movie Theaters Provide Notice as to the Availability of Closed Movie Captioning and Audio Description, 87 Federal Register 33833, June 3, 2022](#)

NOTICE: Requires covered movie theaters to disclose information to the public regarding the availability of closed movie captioning and audio description for movies shown in their auditoriums. Businesses and not-for-profit institutions that own, operate, or lease a movie theater that has one or more auditoriums showing digital movies with closed movie

	<p>captioning and audio description, and that provide notice of movie showings and times. Under the relevant regulation, “movie theater” means a facility other than a drive-in theater that is used primarily for the purpose of showing movies to the public for a fee.</p> <p>COMMENTS DUE: August 2, 2022</p>

Upon approval of this consolidated information collection, OMB Control No. 9000-0196 will be discontinued. <p>Employment Authorization for Cameroonian F-1 Nonimmigrant Students Experiencing Severe Economic Hardship as a Direct Result of the Crises in Cameroon, 87 Federal Register 34701, June 7, 2022</p>	<p>NOTICE: This notice announces that the Secretary of Homeland Security (Secretary) is suspending certain regulatory requirements for F-1 nonimmigrant students whose country of citizenship is Cameroon, regardless of country of birth (or individuals having no nationality who last habitually resided in Cameroon), and who are experiencing severe economic hardship as a direct result of the crises in Cameroon. The Secretary is taking action to provide relief to these Cameroonian nonimmigrant students who are lawful F-1 nonimmigrant students so the students may request employment authorization, work an increased number of hours while school is in session, and reduce their course load while continuing to maintain their F-1 nonimmigrant student status. The U.S. Department of Homeland Security (DHS) will deem an F-1 nonimmigrant student who receives employment authorization by means of this notice to be engaged in a “full course of study” for the duration of the employment authorization, if the nonimmigrant student satisfies the minimum course load requirement described in this notice.</p> <p>EFFECTIVE DATE: June 7, 2022</p>

An agency may not conduct or sponsor, and a respondent is not required to respond to, an information collection unless it displays a currently valid OMB control number. [Proposed Collection; 60-Day Comment Request; Post-Award Reporting Requirements Including Research Performance Progress Report Collection \(OD\), 87 Federal Register 34888, June 8, 2022](#)

NOTICE: Starting in January 2023, NIH will require applicants and recipients to submit and address Data Management and Sharing Plans within the SF424 Research and Related (R&R) application and the Research Performance Progress Report (RPPR) in accordance with the final NIH Policy for Data Management and Sharing (DMS Policy) to promote the management and sharing of scientific data generated from NIH-funded or conducted research. The application and progress report forms will be updated to align with this requirement. NIH will also be updating the PHS 2271 Statement of Appointment form so that trainees appointed to institutional Ruth L. Kirschstein National Service Research Awards (NSRA) can document when they receive support for childcare costs. The RPPR is required to be used by all NIH, Food and Drug Administration, Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, and Agency for Healthcare Research and Quality (AHRQ) grantees. Interim progress reports are required to continue support of a PHS grant for each budget year within a competitive segment. The phased transition to the RPPR required the maintenance of dual reporting processes for a period of time. Continued use of the PHS Non-competing Continuation Progress Report (PHS 2590), exists for a small group of grantees. This collection also includes other PHS post-award reporting requirements: PHS 416-7 NRSA Termination Notice, PHS 2271 Statement of Appointment, 6031-1 NRSA Annual Payback Activities Certification, HHS 568 Final Invention Statement and Certification, iEdison, and PHS 3734 Statement Relinquishing Interests and Rights in a PHS Research Grant. The PHS 416-7, 2271, and 6031-1 is used by NSRA recipients to activate, terminate, and provide for payback of a NSRA.

[Information Collections Being Reviewed by the Federal Communications Commission, 87 Federal Register 35772, June 13, 2022](#)

NOTICE: The Commission adopted the FM Broadcast Directional Antenna Performance Verification Order, FCC 22-38, adopted May 19, 2022, and released on May 19, 2022, where the Commission revised its broadcast radio rules and procedures to allow for FM antenna directional pattern verification by computer modeling. This represents an update from the previous requirement that an FM or LPFM directional antenna's performance be verified by the "measured relative field pattern" and brings our rules for those services into regulatory conformity with our rules governing AM and DTV directional antennas. The Commission expects that this change in how the antenna manufacturer may validate its FM directional antenna studies would provide an FM license applicant with greater flexibility in antenna siting and reduce the overall costs of designing and building an FM directional antenna, and station construction.

Specifically, pertaining to this Information Collection and full-service FM stations, the Commission is revising the relevant rules, 47 CFR 73.316 and 47 CFR 73.1690, and corresponding instructions, as follows: Gives an FM license applicant that employs a directional antenna the option of submitting

<p>Federal Family Education Loan (FFEL) Program Secured Overnight Financing Rate (SOFR) Election Form, 87 Federal Register 35975, June 14, 2022</p>	<p>NOTICE: The Department of Education (ED) is requesting approval of a new information collection for the FFEL Program SOFR Election form. On March 15, 2022, the President signed the Adjustable Interest Rate (LIBOR) Act into law. Among other things, the law amended section 438(b)(2)(I) of the Higher Education Act of 1965, as amended (HEA). This provision of the law requires FFEL Program lenders or an entity that holds a beneficial ownership interest in a FFEL Program loan (beneficial holder) to transition away from LIBOR based Special Allowance Payments (SAP) to a new formula set by the law based on Secured Overnight Financing Rate (SOFR). The transition may occur any time on or before June 30, 2023. However, a FFEL Program lender or beneficial holder must transition to the SOFR based SAP calculation by July 1, 2023, as a condition of continued participation in FFEL Program.</p> <p>COMMENTS DUE: August 15, 2022</p>

<p>Yellow Ribbon Program Agreement and Principles of Excellence for Educational Institutions, 87 Federal Register 39161, June 29, 2022</p>	<p>NOTICE: VA Form 22-0839, Yellow Ribbon Program Agreement, is sanctioned by Public Law 110-252 which authorized the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) to administer an education benefit program known as the Post-9/11 GI Bill. Section 3317 of title 38, United States Code, established the Yellow Ribbon G.I. Enhancement Program, referred to as the "Yellow Ribbon Program". The Yellow Ribbon Program allows institutions of higher Learning (IHLs) to voluntarily enter into an agreement with VA to commit to contributing towards the outstanding amount of tuition and fees not otherwise covered under the Post-9/11 GI Bill. VA will match the contribution made by the IHL not to exceed fifty percent of the total outstanding amount of tuition and fees. IHLs wishing to participate in the Yellow Ribbon Program are required to submit the Yellow Ribbon Program Agreement (VA Form 22-0839) indicating the maximum number of students that can receive this additional benefit under the program, the maximum contribution towards outstanding tuition and fees for each student based on student status (i.e., undergraduate, graduate, doctoral) or sub-element (i.e., college or professional school). Participating schools commit to voluntarily follow the guidelines outlined in Executive Order 13607 intended to promote transparency and student success. Currently, the VA Form 22-0839 includes the Principles of Excellence (POE) application, but because only degree granting schools can participate in the Yellow Ribbon Program, non-degree granting schools are disadvantaged. Further the Yellow Ribbon Program Participation is only solicited during an annual</p>

`open season' from March to May, POE participation is further restricted. VA Form 22-10275 will be made available year-round. Executive Order 13607 necessitates this collection of information.
