
Limitations of Current Standard Practice

- Research is typically time-specific and/or time-limited
- System accountability is sacrificed
 - Replaced by overemphasis on adolescent behavior
 - What is the number or e-mail address for "the system"?
- Similarities and differences commonplace for academia and government organizations aren't shared
 - Missed learning, growth, and empathy
 - Opportunities exists to highlight shared alignment

- Short-Term and Long-Term Quality of Life Metrics Can Be Considered






Absent easily accessible data, when tragedy strikes the blame game quickly ensues between public agencies.
