Part 3: Executive Summary

Guided by National Association of Colleges and Employers (NACE) standards, the University Career Center (UCC) compiles data on the post-graduation pursuits of JMU graduates. For the Class of 2025, the UCC collected data on 76.2% of bachelor's-degree recipients and 76.0% of advanced-degree recipients.

Of bachelor's-degree recipients in the Class of 2025, 94.9% achieved a career outcome. 73.7% of these graduates went to work, while 21.2% continued their education. For those without a career outcome, 5.0% were still seeking employment or education, and the remaining 0.1% were not engaged or not seeking. The most popular areas for work included Virginia, Washington, D.C., New York, New Jersey and Maryland. Of those graduates working in Virginia, 41.8% were working in Northern Virginia, 27.5% were in Central Virginia, and 17.6% were working in the Shenandoah Valley. Health professions, business/management, education, psychology and public administration were the most popular pursuits in continuing education programs.

For advanced-degree recipients in the Class of 2025, 98.6% achieved a career outcome. Of these, 82.9% were working and 15.7% were pursuing additional education. Of the 1.4% without a career outcome, all 1.4% were still seeking. Virginia, Washington, D.C., North Carolina, New York and Pennsylvania were the most popular areas for advanced-degree recipients to work. Of those working in Virginia, 38.0% work in the Shenandoah Valley, 30.0% work in Northern Virginia and 21.7% work in Central Virginia.
