Faculty may choose from a variety of sessions covering many aspects of scholarly lives and responsibilities, or might also choose to focus their time a bit more intensely by following one of three specially designed programming tracks.

Methods & Data Track

Sessions range from introductory research skills – like those in “Meet the Mixed Methods” – to opportunities to work through existing projects via “IRB Tips, Tricks, and Strategies.” Two afternoon sessions offer extended periods of time for “Developing Measurement Skills” and “Working (and Playing) in NVivo”.

Manuscripts & Writing Track

Discover strategies for each stage of the writing process including starting projects (“Mining the Dissertation,” “Writing Book Proposals”), revising existing writing (“Revitalizing Revision”) and planning for future scholarly writing (“Scholarship Agendas: Organize Projects and Manage Your Time”).

Theorizing Teaching Track

One strategy for increasing scholarly production is to explicitly connect teaching and scholarship. From considering “Syllabus Design as Scholarship” to “Growing Undergraduate Research in Your Department” and “Assessing High Impact Practices and Student Engagement in the Classroom,” this track invites faculty to view their classroom responsibilities through scholarly lenses.
