
Welcome Back!

The Fall 2024 VASP conference took place this September at the DoubleTree by Hilton in Charlottesville, Virginia, where practitioners, trainers, and students came together to reconnect, expand awareness, and strengthen competencies for creating positive, supportive environments where children can thrive. Our very own, Dr. Debi Kipps-Vaughan presented a well-received workshop titled "*Belonging is to 'Be Learning': Supporting Highly Engaged Classrooms.*" This session equipped school psychologists with strategies for consulting with teachers to foster highly engaged classrooms. Drawing from Robert Marzano's research, Dr. Kipps-Vaughan discussed the powerful link between students' sense of belonging, their attention, and their engagement in learning environments, highlighting the role of social psychology in enhancing classroom dynamics. Several JMU students were present at the conference and had the opportunity to connect with each other as well as students from other programs at the VASP hosted reception. 


SPGSA
