Workshops

ASIST Training

Death by suicide continues to be a public health crisis, with rates increasing year after year. Despite its prevalence, suicide is a challenging topic to confront.

On February 6th and 7^{th,}, the first-year School Psychology students from James Madison joined counseling students from Eastern Mennonite University for a two-day Applied Suicide Intervention Skills Training Workshop (ASIST).

Throughout the workshop, students engaged in hands-on practice, discussed real-life scenarios, and explored effective intervention techniques. These techniques can be applied across ages and settings. The ASIST model focuses on identifying risk, providing suicide first aid, and developing prevention and intervention plans. As a result of ASIST training, our future school psychologists are now

equipped and certified in ASIST techniques. They can be more prepared to bring essential suicide prevention skills into their communities!

Transition in Program Leadership


