A Year of Collaboration, Innovation, and Strategic Planning

The 2023-2024 academic year has been transformative for the Center for Global Engagement (CGE) at James Madison University (JMU). Collaboration, innovation, and strategic planning have been at the core of our efforts to enhance global engagement and develop students who are both globally minded and locally relevant.

Collaboration with faculty, staff, senior leaders, and global partners has expanded global programs, strengthened international student support, streamlined international faculty hiring, and advanced global learning initiatives. Faculty working groups on global virtual exchange, study abroad learning outcomes, and sustainability in study abroad programs, along with a staff research project on international students' retention, have furthered these goals. Partnerships, including our work with the International Network of Universities (INU), have reinforced JMU's commitment to comprehensive internationalization.

Innovation has been a driving force this year. Our nationally recognized study abroad programs highlight our dedication to impactful learning experiences. We also piloted a global virtual internship program that integrates work-based learning with international perspectives. Participation in the Institute of International Education (IIE) International Academic Partnership Program (IAPP) with Thailand led to visits to 29 Thai institutions, opening new doors for effective collaboration with a strategically important region.

Strategic planning is vital to implement our mission of fostering a globally engaged community. We view comprehensive internationalization at JMU as a dynamic system with shared and individual variables across various levels of interconnected and independent subsystems. Achieving success requires everyone's involvement, unified by shared values, common goals, and detailed strategies for measuring, predicting, and advancing internationalization. **Our strategic plan for 2024-2028** outlines four key goals: develop global engagement for all, elevate JMU's national and global reputation, improve the global capacity on campus, and assess the effectiveness of global programming, offering a clear road map for sustained progress.

We are excited about the future as we continue building a vibrant, globally connected community, ensuring that global engagement remains central to the JMU experience. Our mission is to prepare students to thrive in an interconnected world.

Thank you to our partners, colleagues, students, and CGE staff members for your ongoing support and collaboration. The journey ahead is a collective effort, and together, we are making a lasting impact.

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Awards, Honors and Scholarships

This academic year was an award-worthy year for CGE. Our participants and programs received broad recognition for their hard work and dedication to global learning. The Forum Award on Education Abroad (page 8) and the U.S. Department of State IDEAS grant (page 10) are especially noteworthy recognitions which display JMU's leadership at a national level. CGE also recognizes excellence within JMU, awarding the annual Provost Award for Excellence in Global Education (page 7), as well as the inaugural JMU Study Abroad Awards (page 9) to recognize the work required to lead rigorous and impactful Study Abroad programs.

In addition to excellent programming, several JMU students were recognized for their achievements while presenting internationally. The International Network of Universities (INU) seminars in Hiroshima, Japan, and Bandung, Indonesia (page 31) featured student-led projects that were recognized for outstanding quality.

Lastly, in 2023 CGE received an unprecedented gift to support study abroad students from Paul Holland and Linda Yates (page 6). Their generous funding will allow more students to participate in life-changing experiences who otherwise would not be able to afford the opportunity. CGE is grateful to Holland and Yates for making a significant commitment to support international education at JMU.

Paul Holland and Linda Yates' Gift Increases Study Abroad Scholarship Funding

The dedication of Holland Yates Hall came with an added bonus for the Center for Global Engagement: an increase in scholarship funds to provide study abroad experiences for students. Both Paul Holland and Linda Yates have lived and worked in more than 74 countries, and now they are providing study abroad scholarships for JMU undergraduates, an opportunity they believe is critical for current and future generations. Yates believes Madison graduates will be better equipped to look at the "big hairy problems" of our world—climate change, sustainability, water, disease, racism, poverty—because of their travels. "We hope to give them the opportunity to reach out, to really address those big problems and make a difference," she says. "I can't wait to see the pictures that are going to line the walls in that building as these kids go abroad and show what their experiences are like."

The Forum on Education Abroad awards two JMU faculty for excellence in curriculum design

Dr. Debbie Sturm and Dr. Renee Staton were announced as the 2023 winners of the award, presented by The Forum on Education Abroad, a national study abroad organization. They were selected based on their innovative study abroad program called "Nature, Creativity & Well-Being Across the Lifespan in Scotland" that ran during summer 2023. Drs. Sturm and Staton were chosen winners over finalists from Colorado State University, Purdue University, and University of California, Irvine. The program was awarded for providing an academically rigorous program of study, fostering student development, enriching the classroom experience through the use of the location, and setting a precedent for its exceptional approach to student learning.

Both Dr. Sturm and Dr. Staton are pioneers in their field, and found incredible ways to create ties between psychological theories, well-being, nature, education and cross-cultural learning. The study abroad course also incorporated themes based on the relationship between the natural world and mental health, creativity, and resilience. Students not only learned from local experts, but they had the opportunity to plant trees with retirees and learn about community-inspired nature preservation programs; forage with a local naturist and discuss the impact of tourism on nature and community wellness; and work with children at a nature-based kindergarten. Students on the program received advanced training and were challenged to consider how they would use their experience abroad to positively influence JMU and the surrounding community.

Dr. Hallmon also co-directed a program with Dr. Anaza, who passed away a few days after the program concluded in the summer of 2023. Dr. Hallmon isn't just a colleague to these two individuals, but a dear friend. Dr. Hallmon is a model study abroad leader and mentor, and is passionate about student development and understands the value of study abroad experiences in transforming students.

Debbie also arranged for the students to receive advanced training and invited them to consider how they would use their experience abroad to positively influence JMU and the surrounding community.

Catalyst for Transformation Award: Celebrating High-Impact Study Abroad Programs

Rob and Seán's program, "X-Labs International: Innovative Responses to Sustainability in the Netherlands and Germany," attracted students from 10 different majors for a truly interdisciplinary study abroad experience. Rob and Sean participated in training workshops on design thinking and Responsible Futuring at world renown institutions in Europe. The program embedded students in circular economy consulting firms in Amsterdam and Rotterdam and challenged them to engage in design sprints to create innovative solutions to similar challenges at JMU. The team used Curating Learning Record portfolios as an innovative assessment, putting the emphasis on student-driven storytelling.







John Scherpereel selected for 2023 Erasmus+ Teaching Mobility program

At the end of the 2023 fall semester, political science professor John Scherpereel traveled to Romania as part of the Erasmus+ Teaching Mobility program. Erasmus+ is the European Union's program to support education training in Europe, and their mobility program gives educators to opportunity to travel and teach at an EU partner university.

Scherpereel was hosted by the Romanian-American University (RAU) in Bucharest, Romania. RAU and JMU have close ties, and through this teaching mobility program, seek to increase collaboration by doing more virtual exchanges, teaching partnerships, and development of short-term study abroad programs.

CGE completes U.S. State Department IDEAS Grant

The U.S. Department of State, Bureau of Educational and Cultural Affairs' (ECA) IDEAS Program assists U.S. colleges and universities in creating, broadening, and/or expanding their study abroad programming in support of U.S. foreign policy goals.

JMU's grant used a two-pronged initiative to expand study abroad access for those who are underrepresented in study abroad, including low-income and first-generation students. We developed and implemented a program in the Caribbean focused on environmental studies and geotourism, tailored to the identified student groups, and led an exploratory faculty trip to the Dominican Republic. We then used this program to examine student perspectives and experiences.











Two JMU faculty awarded Fulbright Scholarships

Two College of Arts and Letters faculty members received 2023-24 Fulbright U.S. Scholar Awards. Dr. Daniel Beers (left), associate professor of justice studies, studied humanitarian support for refugees in Romania, while Dr. Ken Rutherford (right), professor of political science, researched disability rights in Vietnam. The Fulbright U.S. Scholar Program offers over 400 awards in more than 135 countries for U.S. citizens to teach, conduct research, and carry out professional projects around the world. It is the U.S. government's flagship program of international education and cultural exchange.

Beers spent the 2023-24 academic year at Babes-Bolyai University in Cluj-Napoca, Romania, where he researched Romania's humanitarian movement. More than a million refugees have crossed into Romania since the outbreak of the war in Ukraine, and despite the size and speed of the crisis, Romanians have responded with an outpouring of humanitarian support.

In spring 2024, Rutherford spent five months at Hue University in Vietnam. Rutherford conducted research on Vietnam's regional and international leadership on disability rights, and humanitarian issues, while teaching a course on American politics and culture.





I-Week Reception

The I-Week reception brought together faculty, staff, and a few special guests to allow CGE to say thank you to our supporters across campus. Attendees heard filmed remarks from Provost Coltman, Vice Provost Sparkman-Key, as well as an address from CGE Executive Director JY Zhou.

In addition to the special remarks, CGE also recognized the four winners of the 2023 I-Week Photo Contest, all of whom were in attendance. Once they were presented with their framed prints, the grand prize winner was announced: Madison Kozlowski for her captivating photo of Antelope Canyon. She told everyone the story of how the photo was captured, and a little background on her process. As the grand prize winner, Madison won \$99 for her flex card and bragging rights for the rest of the year.

The remainder of the reception allowed CGE's partners an opportunity to connect with each other and socialize. JMU is a large campus, and there are only a few opportunities each year to meet informally and share ideas. CGE was glad to facilitate this reception and will look for more collaboration opportunities in the future.






International Student & Scholar Services








To achieve this, we work with international institutions and organizations to provide a variety of resources and programs that go beyond interactions with international students or study abroad experiences. These initiatives include intercultural training, virtual classroom exchanges, and opportunities to participate in international conferences, all of which help students develop essential global skills and experiences.

GLP's commitment extends beyond students. We collaborate extensively with faculty and staff to support curriculum internationalization and to develop globally-focused teaching, learning, and research initiatives. By partnering with international institutions and organizations, we also explore and create innovative opportunities that benefit the entire JMU community.









Global Initiative Grants

Global Initiative Grants (GIGs) are awarded by CGE to support the work of JMU happening abroad. They are given for projects that include education abroad initiatives, engagement with international students and scholars, or to support global learning. Through these grants, CGE aims to facilitate and support projects that advance JMU's global reputation and create transformative international experiences.



GIG Project Highlight: Global Virtual Exchange

In 2023, Shin Ji Kang, professor in education, received GIG funding to create a Global Virtual Exchange (GVE) experience. The project brought together 18 US pre-service elementary teachers and 5 South Korean in-service elementary teachers. The participants engaged in activities designed to learn about each other's cultural autobiographies, and then held focused discussions on sexism. The exchange produced some unexpected outcomes which Shin Ji discussed as part of a presentation on the GVE. Research methods and pedagogical approaches on global learning were also covered in her presentation. Shin Ji hopes this project will lead to future collaborations or publications on the value of virtual exchange.



Awareness into Action: The Lived Experiences of Madison International Students at JMU

In March, 2024 Dr Vesna Hart and Jen Nelson-Faulconer presented about Madison International (MI) during the JMU Diversity Conference. Every academic year MI brings up to 20 highly diverse (nationality, language, race and ethnicity, gender, socioeconomic status) first-year students to live and learn together. Throughout the year they build relationships, participate in dialogues, and cultivate the values of informed and enlightened global citizens. Because of the intentional design and sustained nature of MI, its alumni find their experience in the program helps them far beyond the first year.

The session at the JMU Diversity Conference featured a short presentation, followed by a panel of MI alumni, and concluded with a short Q&A. Presenters provided an introduction to what MI is through a conversation about theoretical frameworks and students exposures to expanded learning experiences, while the panelists focused on relating what they learned in MI to their chosen path after leaving the program. Several themes emerged from this presentation: increased wellbeing, improved ability to engage across differences through dialogue, influence on the choice of major and career, seeking more extracurricular opportunities, enhancing their knowledge, and growth in their sense of belonging.

This consortium of colleges and universities from around the world was founded to advance the goals of international education, global citizenship, and peace. In 2023, each INU member university traveled to Hiroshima to sign the updated INU Charter, which shows JMU's dedication to building global partnerships and advancing our international reputation.

2023-2024 INU Programs

- Student Seminar for Global Citizenship and Peace: A unique immersion program which is hosted by Hiroshima University in Japan. Since 2006, the seminar welcomes students from around the world from INU member universities and is structured around the August 6 commemoration of the atomic bombing of Hiroshima. The 2023 seminar was attended by a delegation of JMU faculty, students, and staff, as well as JMU president Jon Alger.
- International Student Conference on Global Citizenship: Organized by Parahyangan Catholic University (UNPAR) in Indonesia, the ISC is an annual event that brings together students from across the globe to engage in diverse learning approaches that address pertinent current issues under the umbrella theme of Global Citizenship. In early 2024, JMU sent several students and faculty to Indonesia to participate in the conference.
- **Staff Knowledge Exchange:** This program pairs professional and administrative staff at two different INU member institutions for the purpose of discussing, learning, and benchmarking systems and best practices with peers. This year JMU hosted Grayson Lamore (middle photo), a Senior Finance Officer from Stellenbosch University in South Africa, who came to JMU to learn more about the tools and systems used to structure financial operations in US higher education.

International Education Week Featuring a Keynote Address by Dr. Dawn Whitehead

Each year the U.S. State Department, in collaboration with the U.S. Department of Education, organizes a week of events that celebrate the benefits of international education and exchange worldwide. The goal of this joint initiative is to promote programs that prepare Americans for a global environment and attract future leaders from abroad to study, learn, and exchange experiences. This year's theme, "The Future Is..." explored the many way that international education is driving us into the future.

At CGE, we marked International Education Week by hosting a keynote address by Dr. Dawn Whitehead. Dr. Whitehead is the Vice President of the Office of Global Citizenship for Campus, Community, and Careers at the American Association of Colleges and Universities (AAC&U). Her address focused on how the field of higher education has been challenged to become more equitable, aware, and responsive to the intersections of global and local realities over the past few years. She also touched on the elevated importance of global learning while rethinking long-standing practices and approaches to addressing global challenges.

Peace Corps Prep Certificate Program continues to grow

The Peace Corps Prep program prepares students for international development fieldwork and potential Peace Corps service. This year, a record 32 JMU students were enrolled in the Peace Corps Prep program. 8 students completed the certificate, and 9 students are joining for AY24-25. Of the 8 students who completed the program, 6 of them applied to the Peace Corps for AY23-24.



Study Abroad

The Study Abroad team has the privilege of supporting faculty and students achieve their educational goals on a global level. By working together with more than 150 talented faculty from all academic colleges, the Study Abroad team aims to create transformational international learning experiences for students. From studying engineering in Malta to healthcare in Ghana, from learning about marketing in Turkey to happiness in Costa Rica, JMU offers more than 80 programs spanning 50 countries across the world and provides students the opportunity to choose from over 200 courses taught abroad.

Students who study abroad not only dive into their coursework in a culturally immersive setting, but they also have the ability to gain work-based learning experiences by completing an international internship in places like Germany, Australia, Guatemala, and a handful of other countries. These opportunities allow students to position themselves as competitive applicants in a globalized workforce since international experience is proven to help students gain skills in relationship-building, leadership, problem-solving, and intercultural communication – all coveted skills in the modern workplace.

Semester in Spain!

The Semester in Spain program is one of JMU's five flagship semester abroad programs, and is directed by Dr. Tomás Regalado-López, a professor of Spanish in the Department of World Languages. Offered in fall, spring, and summer, this program provides a rich academic and cultural experience, meshing familiar JMU faculty with well-qualified, dedicated faculty from the University of Salamanca. Salamanca, located in northwestern Spain and situated roughly halfway between Madrid and the Portuguese border, is the home-base of the program making it the perfect site from which to explore the rest of the Iberian Peninsula and Europe as a whole. It has the feeling of a modern cosmopolitan city while also maintaining its historic and medieval character.

The summer and fall semesters offer students a full Spanish-immersion program, with all courses taught and excursions guided in Spanish. Students who have a Spanish major or minor benefit from the variety of course offerings including Business Spanish, Latin American Drama and Short Stories, Culture and Medicine in Spain, Spanish Art, and more. Beginning in 2025, the spring semester will be open to non-Spanish speakers and centers around JMU's General Education (Gen Ed) program. Students can receive 12 Gen Ed credits by taking courses from four different Gen Ed areas: American and Global Perspectives, Arts and Humanities, The Natural World, and Sociocultural and Wellness.

In addition to academic coursework, students in all semesters engage in program excursions, cultural opportunities, and Spanish site-seeing. All students also have the chance to complete an internship experience.




Adult Degree Program in Germany

For the last three years, JMU has championed an innovative study abroad program created for students enrolled in JMU's Adult Degree Program (ADP). The ADP is an online undergraduate degree completion program that allows students to create a personalized interdisciplinary concentration to meet their educational and career goals. Students who are part of the ADP can apply to participate on this unique study abroad program, and if selected, their participation in the program is fully covered by scholarships provided by the Online Virginia Network (OVN). OVN provides generous funding for online students across Virginia to participate in high-impact in-person programming, and selected JMU's study abroad programs for this partnership.

The study abroad program, Exploration of Migration and Culture and Germany, provides students the opportunity to take their learning abroad to explore first-hand the issues and opportunities related to migration in eastern Germany and Poland. In partnership with Europa-Universität Viadrina, students spend 11 days taking an in-depth exploration of the history, culture and support of refugees in the region through guest lectures, site visits and excursions, and interactions with local and international students.

While the future of funding from OVN isn't guaranteed, JMU Study Abroad is excited to continue partnering with the ADP to make this program possible for future cohorts.


Study Abroad Destinations 2023 - 2024






