Welcome to 12th International Women in French Conference hosted here at James Madison University, an institution dedicated to scholarly-research excellence and immersive learning experiences.

The range of approaches reflected in this year's program is fitting for the College of Arts and Letters, long the intellectual home for scholarship by and about women. Like this conference, CAL celebrates global perspectives, nurtures interdisciplinary collaboration and dialogue, and cultivates an intellectual community in which scholars and students can thrive.

You may be familiar with the saying, "Well-behaved women seldom make history," but perhaps not its origins: it first appeared in an obscure 1976 scholarly article, by American historian Laurel Thatcher Ulrich, as an observation about the lives of ordinary women. In her 2007 book about the statement's popularity, Ulrich then focused on three extraordinary, history-making women: American suffragette Elizabeth Cady Stanton, British feminist Virginia Woolf, and 15th century French court writer, Christine de Pizan, who in 1405 published a prose work about famous women.

Ulrich's message about the relationship between history and unconventionality stretches over time, around the globe, between languages, even across the scholarly and the popular. I can't think of a better way to honor this conference and its focus on transgression: the crossing of boundaries between cultures, nations, language traditions, disciplines, genres — and behaviors.

Born in Meknes, lives and works in Marrakech. Rajae Benchemsi is a poet, novelist, writer and art critic. She is a former lecturer in the history of ideas at the École Normale Supérieure of Meknès and a former presenter on the 2M television channel. She has numerous publications to her credit, including collections of poetry and novels, an essay on art and two monographs on Farid Belkahia, one published by Editions Skira Paris and the other by Editions Venise Cadre. In 2015, she founded the Farid Belkahia Foundation, of which she is President, and in 2016 the Mathaf Farid Belkahia Museum. She is a member of AICA-France (International Association of Art Critics).

### **DR. PETER EUBANKS**

Peter Eubanks (Ph.D. Princeton) is Professor French at James Madison University. His research and teaching interests center around early modern French poetry (including Christine de Pisan, Marguerite d'Autriche, and Marguerite de Navarre) and cross-cultural encounters and misunderstandings (particularly in the Franco-American space). His articles have appeared in *Bibliothèque d'Humanisme et Renaissance*, *Montaigne Studies*, *Contemporary French and Francophone Studies*, *Literature and Belief*, and other venues. His keynote address on "The History of French at James Madison University: Insights and Inflection Points" is the result of a collaboration with several first-year female undergraduate students under the auspices of the JMU First-Year Research Experience Program (FYRE).

**DR. DOE POLANZ**

Doe Polanz ([polanzdx@jmu.edu](mailto:polanzdx@jmu.edu)) has been teaching French and Acting for the past 18 years in the greater D.C area and is an Associate Professor at James Madison University in Virginia. Polanz's research interests range from the 18th-century libertine novel, engravings and automaton to 19th-century Orientalism, performance and film studies. She published several articles on the Marquis de Sade and Marie Antoinette and their representations in movies and pop culture. She was a consultant at the National Museum of the French Revolution (Vizille, France) analyzing the representation of Marie Antoinette in America and Japan (in movies, manga and in pop culture) showcasing her own impressive collection of pop objects revolving around the infamous French Queen. Her collection was also featured at Syracuse University in October 2025 where she was invited to receive the Harold Jones Award for Best Essay for 2024 for her article "From Myth to Meme: Reinventing (Yet Again) Marie Antoinette in the Age of Streaming".

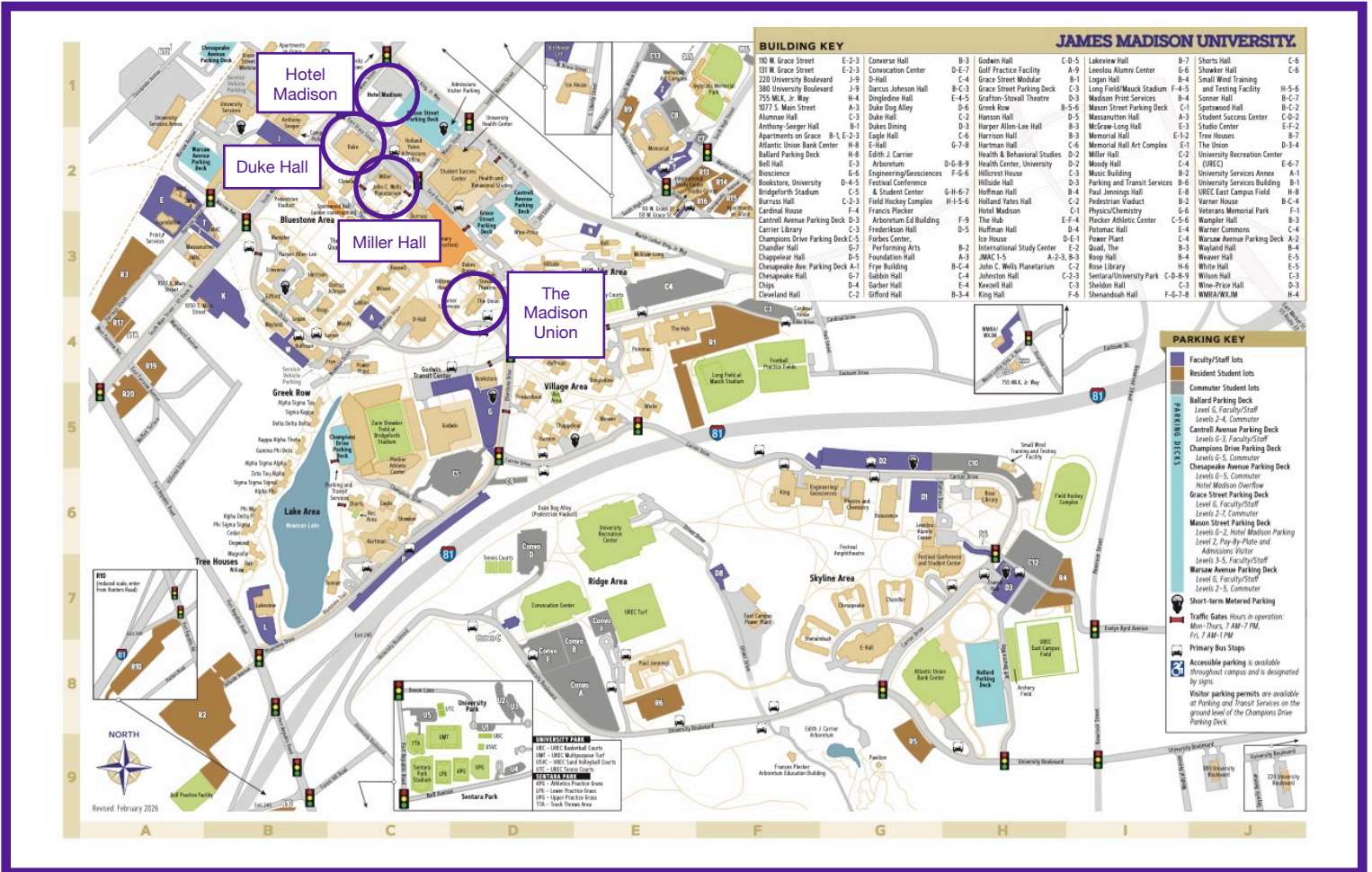

# A HISTORY OF JMU



Founded in 1908 as the State Normal and Industrial School for Women, James Madison University was originally established to prepare women for careers in teaching, responding to the growing demand for public school educators in the early twentieth century. At its inception, the institution consisted of only two buildings—now known as Gabbin Hall and Jackson Hall—which remain part of the historic campus quadrangle. Over time, the University expanded both physically and academically, evolving from a specialized teacher-training school into a comprehensive public university offering a wide range of undergraduate and graduate programs. This year, Keezell Hall—home to the Department of World Languages and Cultures—celebrates its 100th anniversary, marking a century of language learning and global engagement at the University.



The College of Arts and Letters stands at the academic core of the University. Established in 1971, the College plays a central role in the education of all undergraduates by providing foundational instruction in the humanities, languages, social sciences, and the arts. It is one of the University's largest academic divisions, serving thousands of students across





numerous departments, including English; World Languages and Cultures; History; Philosophy and Religion; Sociology and Anthropology; Political Science; Justice Studies; the School of Writing, Rhetoric and Technical Communication; the School of Media Arts and Design; and the School Communication Studies. Through its diverse array of majors, minors, and graduate programs, the College fosters critical thinking, cultural awareness, and interdisciplinary engagement.



Within the College, the Department of World Languages and Cultures occupies an important place in the University's liberal arts mission. The department offers five majors (Arabic, French, German, Italian, and Spanish), as well as six minors, three professional minors, and three interdisciplinary minors. French, one of the earliest languages offered at JMU, continues to play a central role

within this academic landscape. The program contributes through its major and minors, as well as a range of courses that engage students with the language and the rich cultural, historical, and literary traditions of the Francophone world.

Throughout its evolution, the University has maintained its longstanding commitment to academic excellence while broadening its mission to meet the needs of a diverse and dynamic student population. What began as a small, specialized institution has grown into a vibrant academic community, grounded in the liberal arts and dedicated to fostering intellectual and cultural inquiry.

## Amina Saidou

Dr. Amina Saidou is assistant professor of French and Francophone Studies at James Madison University in Virginia since 2022. She holds a master's and a Ph.D. in French and Francophone Studies from the University of Louisiana at Lafayette, US. His keynote address on "The History of French at James Madison University: Insights and Inflection Points" is the result of a collaboration with several first-year female undergraduate students under the auspices of the JMU First-Year Research Experience Program (FYRE).

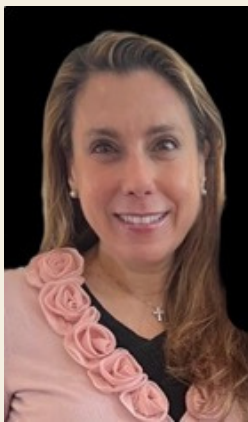
## Dorothee Polanz

Doe Polanz has been teaching French and Acting for the past 18 years in the greater D.C. area and is an Associate Professor at JMU. Polanz's research interests range from the 18th-century libertine novel, engravings and automaton to 19th-century Orientalism, performance and film studies. She published several articles on the Marquis de Sade and Marie Antoinette and their representations in movies and pop culture. She was a consultant at the National Museum of the French Revolution (Vizille, France) analyzing the representation of Marie Antoinette in America and Japan (in movies, manga and in pop culture) showcasing her own impressive collection of pop objects revolving around the infamous French Queen. Her collection was also featured at Syracuse University in October 2025 where she was invited to receive the Harold Jones Award for Best Essay for 2024 for her article "From Myth to Meme: Reinventing (Yet Again) Marie Antoinette in the Age of Streaming".

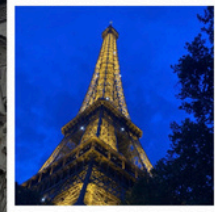

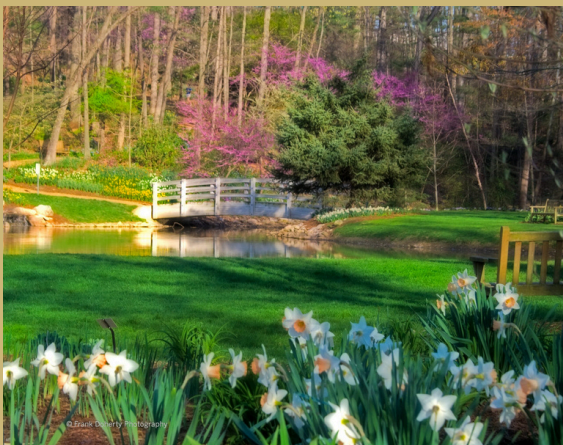

### Amina Saidou

Dr. Amina Saidou is assistant professor of French and Francophone Studies at James Madison University in Virginia since 2022. She holds a master's and a Ph.D. in French and Francophone Studies from the University of Louisiana at Lafayette, US. Saidou received a B.A. in TESOL from Wilson College, Pennsylvania, a BA and MA in Anglophone Literature from Abdou Moumouni University, Niger. She is a JMU Faculty Fellow in Collaborative Dialogue, a Fulbright scholar (2009-2011) and a Carnegie African Diaspora Fellow (2024). She currently teaches 20th and 21st century literature, cinema, and cultures from Sub-Saharan Africa, Maghreb, the Caribbean, and the African Diaspora. Dr. Saidou is the author of several articles, and a book titled *Allégorie initiatique et stratégies de résistance féminines*.

### Yenisei Montes de Oca

Dr. Yenisei Montes de Oca is an Associate Professor in the Department of World Languages and Cultures at James Madison University. Originally from Tijuana, México, her transborder upbringing informs her work on bilingualism, cultural identity, and intercultural dialogue. She earned her B.A. in Spanish and Psychology and her M.A. and Ph.D. in Hispanic Studies at the University of California, Riverside. Her research focuses on 20th- and 21st-century Spanish literature, with particular attention to memory, trauma, and identity in narratives of the Spanish Civil War and its aftermath, as well as transnational approaches to cultural trauma. Some of her publications include *Narrativa española y colombiana: una aproximación transnacional al trauma cultural contemporáneo* (Pijao Editores, 2022) and the co-authored article "Benefits and Impact of Bilingual Education: Dual Masters Degree in Spanish Language and Culture for Educators" (*International Journal on Responsibility*, 2025).



### Verónica Dávila-Ellis

Verónica Dávila Ellis (they/them/elle) is a cultural critic, musician, and listener. They are currently an Assistant Professor of Spanish in the World Languages and Cultures Department at James Madison University. Their first monograph, titled *Uttering Sonic Dominicanidad*, centers the voices and production techniques of queer Dominican dembow performers to analyze how artists and audiences negotiate scripts of gender, race, and sexuality through sound. Their research on queerness, womanhood, and race in reggaetón and dembow has appeared in print and audio publications such as *Revista de Género y Sexualidades*, *CENTRO Journal*, *Oxford American*, *Ori Magazine*, *USA Today*, *The Washington Post*, *NACLA*, and *Afropop Worldwide*.
