Class of 2024 Career Outcomes Overview

95.2% of Bachelor's and Advanced-Degree Recipients have a Career Outcome

Career Outcome	Bachelor's	Advanced Degree	All Graduates
Working	72.8%	92.4%	75.0%
Continuing Education	22.2%	4.3%	20.2%
Total with a Career Outcome	95.0%	96.7%	95.2%
Still Seeking (employment or education)	4.6%	3.1%	4.4%
Not Seeking (due to life event, travel, etc.)	0.4%	0.2%	0.4%
Total without a Career Outcome	5.0%	3.3%	4.8%

The data reflects knowledge of 3,482 bachelor's-degree recipients and 422 advanced-degree recipients, for a knowledge rate of 73.7%.





Secret to Success at JMU





Cultivate the higher ed academic mindset

- Plan when to study (multiply classroom time by 2)
- Identify each professor's specific expectations
- Reflect midway through (midterm grades in October)
- · Strategize about managing email
- Think ahead ex: study abroad; career planning
- Engage both inside AND outside of class

Engage in class

- Attend regularly
- Be prepared for class
- Read materials prior to coming to class
- Develop good study habits
- Track all due dates (planner, calendar, etc.)



More Secrets to Success



Seek out relationships with faculty and staff

- Find a mentor(s)
- Use advisor as a resource
- Go to faculty office hours
- Participate in faculty research



Find belonging by getting involved on campus

- Get to know faculty and staff
- Engage both inside and outside of class
- Balance fun and learning
- Take advantage of the campus recreation center
- Look into discipline-specific student organizations/clubs

Transition to College Coursework

The expectations regarding course work will be different from high school or previous institution.

- Increased independence
- Fewer (to no) reminders of assignment deadlines
- · Learning strategies will need to change
 - Less emphasis on memorization
 - Will need to retain information beyond the first test
- Requires time management to balance time and studying
- Get yourself organized
- Ask for assistance!
- Assume responsibility for your own education



Tips for Engaging with Faculty

- Ask questions during class for clarification
- Seek assistance before it's too late
- Demonstrate professional behavior, both in person and in emails
- Don't be shy
- Learning about their teaching and research
- Consider their research opportunities
- Maintain the relationship
- Seek face-to-face interactions

- **1** in 6 new students are transfers
 - **75%** are from Virginia
 - 70% come from community colleges
 - **50%** earned associate degrees
- **1** in **6** graduates are transfer students

Important Transfer Policies

1) The 25% and 50% Rules

- At least 120 credits to graduate in most majors
- 60 from a 4-year school, 30 from JMU

2) The General Education waiver

- Gen Ed waived for Virginia associate degrees
- Others satisfy Gen Ed through course-by-course review

3) Appealing transfer credit

- When a class showing OOO credit may have a JMU equivalent
- Submit transfer credit reevaluation request + syllabus
- Remember: Elective credit is helpful credit!
