

Survey Methodology and Sample Fall 2022

In Fall 2022, the Office of Institutional Research distributed the Continuing Student Survey, an instrument that requests responses from JMU students to understand their perceptions and degree of satisfaction with JMU, along with personal values, attitudes, and beliefs. Demographic data were also collected.

With the support of the Provost and the academic deans, a representative sample of approximately 20 percent of the undergraduate student body was selected for participation. Four separate forms of the 2022-23 survey were distributed via select faculty during class times, and 2,492 usable surveys were returned. Each form contains 35 common questions and then a form specific battery of questions. The number of completed surveys for the respective forms (A-D) were 617, 642, 619, 614.³

The sample was representative of the JMU student population on key demographics including sex/gender, race, first generation status and student level.



³ Based on the sample sizes for each survey and the JMU student population, the margin of error is approximately 4% with a 95% confidence interval. Thus, we can be 95% sure that the estimates derived from the survey are within plus-or-minus 4% of the true value.
