**SUSPECT(S):**

In compliance with the "Timely Notice" provisions of the federal *Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Campus Crime Statistics Act of 1998* the James Madison University Police Department is giving notice of an alleged malicious wounding reported by the Harrisonburg Police Department on Saturday, 01-14-2012.

Jan. 14, 2012

The Harrisonburg Police Department continues investigating a shooting that took place in the early-morning hours.

This morning around 2:40 a.m. officers responded to an apartment in the 1100 block of Devon Lane for the report of a shooting.

A 21-year-old non - student male was shot in the leg and taken to Rockingham Memorial Hospital with non-life threatening injuries.

It appears as though the offender was outside the apartment, shot through the apartment door, and struck the victim.

Earlier in the evening officers were called twice to the same area for a group of people being disorderly.

Investigators continue following up on information received in this case.

Be particularly cautious about leaving ground level doors and windows unsecured and even individual room and office doors in complexes

where multiple occupants have access to common areas inside the perimeter of the residential, administrative and academic facilities. This warning also extends to vehicles. Car windows should be up, car doors should be locked and valuable contents should be secured out of sight.
