In compliance with the "Timely Notice" provisions of the federal *Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Campus Crime Statistics Act of 1998* the James Madison University Police Department is giving follow up information of an alleged armed robbery reported by the Harrisonburg Police Department on Thursday, May 31, 2012.

June 3, 2012

On June 2, 2012 the Harrisonburg Police Department charged 39 year old Khallyck Yamil Figueroa Torres of 48B South Avenue Harrisonburg, Virginia in connection with the May 20, 2012 robbery at 7-11 and the May 31, 2012 robbery at the Days Inn.

As a result of the continued investigation into the robbery at the Wilco/Hess station on May 31, 2012, he was charged Saturday evening with two more counts of robbery and two more counts use of a firearm during the commission of a felony. These new charges are in relation to the 7-11 and the Days Inn robberies.

Anyone with information leading to the arrest of either suspect is asked to call Crime Solvers. Tipsters may text "HPD" plus their tip to CRIMES (274637) or call 574-5050. Crime Solvers is an anonymous tip line and callers could receive up to a \$1,000 reward. JMU and the City of Harrisonburg want to encourage everyone in the Community to exercise good crime prevention strategies all the time and to make these good daily habits. Close and lock all exterior doors and windows at night and anytime the area is

left unattended whether it be for 5 minutes or 5 days to go to class, go to the store, visit a friend or leave town for the holiday. Be particularly cautious about leaving ground level doors and windows unsecured and even individual room and office doors in complexes where multiple occupants have access to common areas inside the perimeter of the residential, administrative and academic facilities. This warning also extends to vehicles. Car windows should be up, car doors should be locked and valuable contents should be secured out of sight.
