### REMEMBERING MARTIN

The past year marked a period of unprecedented change for our generation and for many, a season of loss. Our program and students were no exception to that loss.

Three years ago, Martin was diagnosed with a rare and aggressive from of brain cancer: Glioblastoma Multiforme. Since his initial diagnosis, Martin received several treatments and experienced periods of time in remission. When the family received news his tumor had returned though, treatments were ineffective. On March 6, 2021, after several months of specialist and experimental treatments, Martin passed away at home with his family.

Despite the toll cancer would ultimately take on Martin, he refused to compromise who he was. From relearning to speak to the constant illness during treatment, Martin remained quietly determined to succeed. Instead of taking easier classes, Martin insisted on staying in AP and dual enrolled classes. Instead of giving up on playing sports, he played even when it made him sick. By all accounts, Martin was an example to others; he was a leader.

For those who knew Martin, they would say he brought with him a contagious atmosphere of joy, empathy, and gratitude. The Valley Scholars at Stonewall Jackson High School who knew him best would attest to the fact that Martin was just one of those people you wanted to be around, that he was a truly good person. All of them share stories of his efforts to make them feel welcome in Valley Scholars. They would also tell you of his hilariously bad jokes, love for Cheerwine and his favorite food: fried chicken. In other words, Martin was full of character and at the same time, was a character.

For Valley Scholars, we mourn Martin's death, but celebrate the life he lived.

Martin's legacy will always be remembered as he truly left his mark on Madison.

#### VALLEY SCHOLARS GIVE BACK

For the first time in a year, students were able to volunteer their time for community service. Partnered with Friends of the Middle River, several students in the Staunton area participated in Clean the Bay Day at Asylum Creek.
