

Scholarship Guide for Seniors

Step-By-Step Guide to find and apply to the right scholarships for you!

Types of Scholarships

Before you begin to look for scholarships, you need to be aware of the types of scholarships that are available and which typeS you may qualify for.

Merit-Based

The primary criterion for meritbased scholarships is exceptional academic performance. Other selection criteria may include leadership, extracurricular involvement, and career goals.

Need-Based

The primary criterion for needbased scholarships is a great financial need, proven by the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). Also known as "Grants."

Pre-Search Preparation

Looking for scholarships will be more manageable if you have outlined information about yourself into a variety of categories. Examples of questions to ask yourself:

| What am I planning to study in college? | What have been my greatest academic or leadership achievements? | What regional area do I fall in? |
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| ls my race considered to be a minority group? | Will I be a first- generation college student? | What community service have I participated in? |
| Do I have a story of a lesson learned from a significant experience in my life? | Set up a document to use during your scholarship search. You can organize this into a running collection of your accomplishments, similar to how professionals use resumes. Input information like scholarship name, website, and deadline date for easy referral. | |

Finding Local Scholarships

Students should start their search with local scholarships because the narrow criteria provides great opportunity for students in your position.

Check Your Guidance Office: Guidance counselors can offer great advice on finding the perfect college for you and can be knowledgeable about the financial aid process. They may be aware of available scholarships in your community.

Check with Businesses in the Area: Many businesses have scholarships and other financial assistance opportunities open to their employees and children of their employees.

Contact State or Local Agencies: Nearly every state offers scholarships that are specifically intended for residents. You may find scholarships available to minorities, low-income families, nontraditional students, and students seeking careers in high-demand fields.

Online Search Example



Start with a simple Google search, like the one pictured to the left. Search for scholarships in the Shenandoah Valley, or be more specific and searcher scholarships in your actual city. Take the time and browse through each Google result.

Finding National Scholarships

After determining the local scholarships that match your qualifications, shift your focus to national level awards.

Check University Websites: Visit the financial aid web-page of each university/college that you are applying to. Typically, these schools have merit and need-based scholarships listed for prospective incoming freshmen.
